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The Carré des Jardiniers contest in a nutshell

Carré des Jardiniers has been giving outstanding gardens a place of honour in the public eye since 2011, with its organization of a unique contest open to landscape contractors and designers from all over France.

Every two years, this iconic competition in the sector invites professionals to form a mixed team of experienced profiles and young talents who, given a specific theme, collectively apply their minds and create a remarkable 200 square metre ephemeral garden.

Live at the Paysalia trade show, teams who make it to the final will compose their garden and present it to a panel of expert judges and an audience of professional visitors.

The judges deliberate and agree on a winner, who is crowned Master Gardener and bears the profession's standard for the next two years.

In synergy with the Paysalia and Rocalia trade shows

At the centre of the Paysalia trade show, rubbing shoulders with sister show Rocalia, will be the 7th edition of the Carré des Jardiniers contest. Both these trade shows run from 5-7th December, 2023 at France's Eurexpo Lyon.

The joint organization helps contestants extend their visibility, as each edition of Paysalia and Rocalia attracts all stakeholders in the sectors of natural stone, landscapes, gardens, and sports grounds in France. In 2021, the 1,481 suppliers and brands present welcomed almost 29,000 visitors common to both shows.





THE 2023 THEME

Biodiver'Cité: an invitation to get to grips with the town of tomorrow

For 2023, contestants vying for the title of Master Gardener have been invited to work on the theme of the responsible green town of the future: the "Biodiver'Cité".

Nowadays, one French person in every three lives in urban surroundings. Dynamic, bustling, and noisy, city life can give rise to feelings of stress, anxiety, even solitude. How can landscape development, notably through parks and gardens, play a greater part in reconfiguring urban life; what new approaches can it

try to make it spread across all the districts of a town? When a town takes to the garden, how do gardens permeate the town and become a place for devising and building the city of tomorrow: the Biodiver'Cité?

These are all questions the finalists of the 7th edition of Carré des Jardiniers will try to answer when creating their ephemeral garden live at Paysalia. In doing so, they will reveal their personal interpretation of the Biodiver'Cité.

WHO IS VINCENT?

With a professional diploma in landscape development and after a sabbatical year spent travelling, Vincent Grunewald completed his studies at the ITIAPE engineering institute. In 2017, a year after obtaining his degree, he founded his company in the southern French town of Cavaillon. Having always had a protective outlook on the environment, Vincent naturally aligned his garden architecture business with the ecological transition of outdoor spaces. Now based in Mâcon in Burgundy, he thoughtfully guides and assists clients in their future-responsible choices. He promotes work methods based on cooperation with clients and craft specialists. A real plant lover, he likes to take special care of existing vegetation, dissolving the boundary between the emerging garden and its containing landscape. What's his extra something? Vincent is a big proponent of material reuse and proves that with creativity, everything can be made to fit today's tastes.

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HIS PROJECT

L'Entre Deux Bruits Between two noises



There's no one-size-fits-all model for towns. They nonetheless often share an intensity of flows as well as essential activities that enable its habitants to get from A to B, to eat and drink, to be housed, and to enjoy life. Intensity usually means noise, and noise is often synonymous with annoyance.

Parks and gardens are therefore a kind of cocoon where the relentless city rhythm has no purchase.

That was the starting point of my idea: How can inhabitants unwind in a place shielded from urban clamour?

The sustainably expansible town is a thing of the past.

These days it must be reconstructed from within, freeing up abandoned or unfrequented spaces, optimizing the use of square metres, reusing whatever is there, protecting the existing vegetation. Our proposition is therefore to take over small spaces to provide citizens with a nearby offering of greenery and respite.

The "L'Entre deux Bruits" garden has two main features: a noise-damping wall and a large wooden structure in the middle.



Antoine De Lavalette

Nature & Création (near Toulouse)

WHO IS ANTOINE?

With a childhood stretching from France to Thailand, Antoine De Lavalette grew up with two different visions of nature. After his initial leaning toward law and language studies, a yearning for freedom and love for the Earth changed his course toward gardens. After graduating with a diploma from the Higher National College of Landscaping, Antoine De Lavalette took his first steps alongside landscaper Camille Muller before continuing up the learning curve with his father and his uncle in the family business near Toulouse. Today, he has carved a place among the gardening teams and taken over the reins at landscaping firm Nature & Création alongside his cousin, with a 13-strong staff. Antoine now creates gardens that allow nature to express itself, that mirror his thoughts, and are soaked in memories still present in his dreams.

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L'im.pas.si.sage

A clever portmanteau that translates to "the impudent blind alley". When you set foot inside, disorder lies in wait: an air of abandon, cracked earth, broken pavements. A forgotten worksite of an alley, whose entrance

looks like the outcome of a fight between building and nature. A sadlooking place crying out for life to move in.

So how about allowing nature to unpack its bags there?

So how about seeing it in a different light?

How about choosing to guide it instead of constricting it?

Step by step, as the visitor advances in

the alley, the decor changes and nature pokes its nose into the scene. All by itself, nature advances and evolves. All by itself, it starts filling in the gaps and working its way into all the corners. The cracks, the flaws, all the shortcomings of concrete give way to vegetation. And the street becomes a garden as though mankind had chosen to live with it.

And the blind alley springs to life!

Plants colonize the town, our alleyway soon becomes a space for awakening our curiosity, and we venture in. Nature now seems living, freer, wilder. A forgotten blind alley that we rediscover as a not-so-sage passage: an "im.pas. si.sage".

The public space now belongs to everyone!

The plants have taken up position; now it's the people's turn to become protagonists, adding their contributions and taking ownership of this urban environment to feel a bit more at home there. A communal area becomes fun and creative. People and nature rub shoulders in a town that seems made for their cohabitation, a long-awaited "Biodiver'Cité".

And what if plants became an instinctive reflex?

What if we designed the town of tomorrow around them?

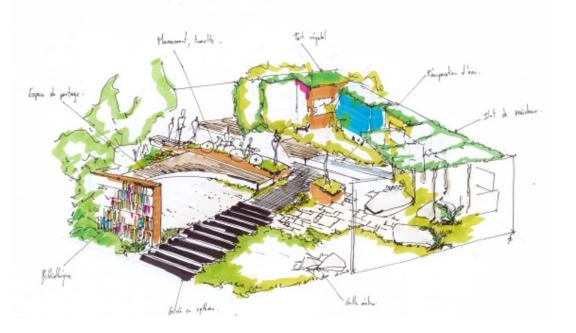
WHO IS SIMON?

Simon Freitag became excited about his future trade while still at school, as soon as he set foot in the vocational course on landscape development. After acquiring a professional diploma then a degree, he joined forces with a friend from his academic years to create "La Couleur des Jardins" in the Moselle department. Eight years down the line, the firm has roughly thirty employees split between two sites: Forbach and Lutz, near Thionville.

Staunchly rooted in Lorraine in the east of France, La Couleur des Jardins teams work mostly for private individuals, designing and building gardens from A to Z for them. For Simon, who tickles his customers' fancy with hand-drawn impressions and provides assistance throughout the project, the way to cultivate the garden art is to take one's time and open the door to complementary trades like horticulture and decoration.

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HIS PROJECT

La vi'll'e de demain the town (and life) of tomorrow

Urban development has limits, nature has rights, and people have duties.

Our garden sets out to temper the breakneck rhythm of our lives by restoring nature to the centre of our concerns so we can enjoy its gifts. We chase away the city commotion at the garden entrance, along a path resembling a piano keyboard. Everyone can explore the inside at their own rhythm.

We chase away the city stink with the pleasant odour of plants growing under grilles that remind us of basement vents. We bring meaning to our creations.

We learn from the past to construct a better future: a real library symbolizing learning provides our welcome to this garden: what have been mankind's actions on its environment? What mustn't we repeat, what must we change, or indeed, what must we persevere with?

We take our time and create a time of sharing: A long bench, sweeping around the mini-plaza in a great arc, invites intercourse.

We counteract the heat of urban materials with islands of cool: a plant-covered roof on the buildings and a living pergola made of shade trees.

We escape the dullness of tarmac with plants dominating every item of urban equipment. We enlarge the space with coloured mirrors on building facades dancing with the scenery We inspire meditation with the soothing sound of rainwater trickling off roofs to fill the pond. If we give Nature back the place we owe it, it will pay us back a hundred fold.

We just have to give it time.

WHO IS MATTHIEU?

While he was still studying for a technical diploma in livestock production, Matthieu Carla started his own landscaping firm. It was a big gamble for a 20 year-old who just wanted to be in contact with the earth and lend a hand to the people around him. Little by little he became more professional, specializing in landscape creation and managing to grow his business. Nowadays, he and his wife run Les Jardins de Matthieu together, employing eight workers and two apprentices in Cugnaux, right next door to Toulouse. This family business has made a priority of offering bespoke solutions to customers that match their desires and needs while conforming to the house style and the garden's immediate surroundings. And the end goal? To bring happiness and well-being to those who like spending their time outdoors.

Jardin suspendu the suspended garden

This creation sets out to extend and upvalue the landscape gardener's outreach by providing access to a new creative platform.

His work therefore consists in finding new action paths for his sector to incorporate vegetation at every storey.

"All this work should raise awareness within our sector and help converge building and local administration activities.

It's our responsibility to address tomorrow's issues in the landscaping world and to see the ecological and green transition through to a satisfactory conclusion. The purpose of our entry is to project ourselves into this future and show how our towns can stop creating green lungs because they have become lungs in themselves.

With our project, we want to show new constructions made of new materials, like the "building" using CLT (cross-laminated timber) technology: large boards that can be used by landscapers as well as builders to create service cabins, waste bin pens, garden shelters, and other items limited only by one's imagination.

We have taken much delight in working on this "Biodiver'Cité" theme, and we plan to take up the future challenges of the landscaping world: how to make tomorrow's towns live with plants as roommates.

For the contest's 6th edition in 2021, Carré des Jardiniers invited candidates to cogitate on the theme of "le jardin du (bon) vivant" - the living garden (for good living). After the judges' deliberation, Franck Serra, boss of the Dordogne company "Serra Paysage", was crowned Master Gardener for his "Human & Sens" (human and sensual) project.

THE JUDGES

A panel of outstanding judges with a passion for all things living

To designate the 2023 Master Gardener, a panel of **14 renowned professionals** will be judging the Carré des Jardiniers.

They're the ones who will go through all the entries, shortlist ten projects for interview, then narrow the choice down to four finalists. During the live final at the Paysalia trade show, they will visit the created gardens before electing the Master Gardener!

On what criteria do the judges select the finalists?

The judges appraise the quality of the projects entered and attribute scores for technical, creative, and aesthetic excellence: relevance of the layout and the palette, quality of the features created, adherence to the theme, originality of interpretation, etc.

They attach specific importance to the social skills, values, and motivations of pretendents to the Master Gardener throne.
